### Refugee Awareness Day at Scopus

MOUNT Scopus College year 10 students recently participated in a Refugee Awareness Day in partnership with Stand Up.

In addition to hearing from a refugee on the conflict in Darfur, they gained an understanding of the legal, societal and ethical issues regarding refugees through a series of workshops and presentations. Students considered these questions through the lens of their Jewish identity and as internationally-minded citizens.

Students also took part in a session which explored the media's presentation of refugees.

A new component of the day this year, saw students participate in a workshop with Tal Shmerling based on a project called Our Stories, which involves collecting stories of refugees, focusing on the significant and difficult choices they face starting a new life in Australia.

A website is being developed which will contain the interactive stories, as well as a suite of educational resources for teachers. The focus of the project is empathy, leading to action and will launch in the second half of 2018.
